

<u>A Brief Introduction:</u> The symbolic Red Fort of Delhi, despite its iconic status, has had a bit of an up and down journey. Ever since the Army moved out of the fort in 2003, attempts to renovate and preserve this historic site have been discussed, criticised and even taken to court. After spending years restoring several barracks within the fort, the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) has opened the multi-storey barracks to the public. Of these, barrack no. 4, in collaboration with DAG, offers a unique visual history of India through its art titled <u>Drishyakala</u>.

Drishyakala Art Museum, Barrack 4 is a spectacular showcase of the art from colonial India (18th century till 1950). Dug out from the deep by DAG, there are 450 works on display, spread over 27,000sqft. These are rare paintings which DAG has never exhibited.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi officially inaugurated this museum on 23rd January 2019, on the occasion of 123rd birth anniversary of Subhash Chandra Bose
