Dear Parents,





While they enhance their language skills and cognitive abilities, there's also a noted tendency toward aggression and violence. (Refer to the accompanying images) Children often mimic cartoon characters, sometimes leading to unintended aggressive behavior, which can manifest negatively, especially when interacting with peers or siblings.

Therefore, it's crucial for us as teachers and parents to monitor and guide our children's cartoon viewing responsibly. Encouraging content that promotes positive values while discouraging excessively violent or aggressive depictions can help shape healthier behavioural patterns in our children.

Some tips for the parents:

- Watch cartoons with your Kids.
- Limit the number of screen hours and encourage them to indulge in physical activities.
- Select appropriate or educational cartoons.
- Explain the difference between cartoons and reality.
- Use filtering and monitoring applications to filter out inappropriate content and lock content which you do not want your child to access.
- Explore informative channels like Discovery, National Geographic, and Animal Planet for informative and educational content that will aid in the overall development of your child.
- Encourage your child to watch programmes with language aids that help them learn letters of the alphabet, words and rhymes.
- Use audio CDs-for story-time and rhymes rather than cartoons, as this will encourage your child to be a better listener.
